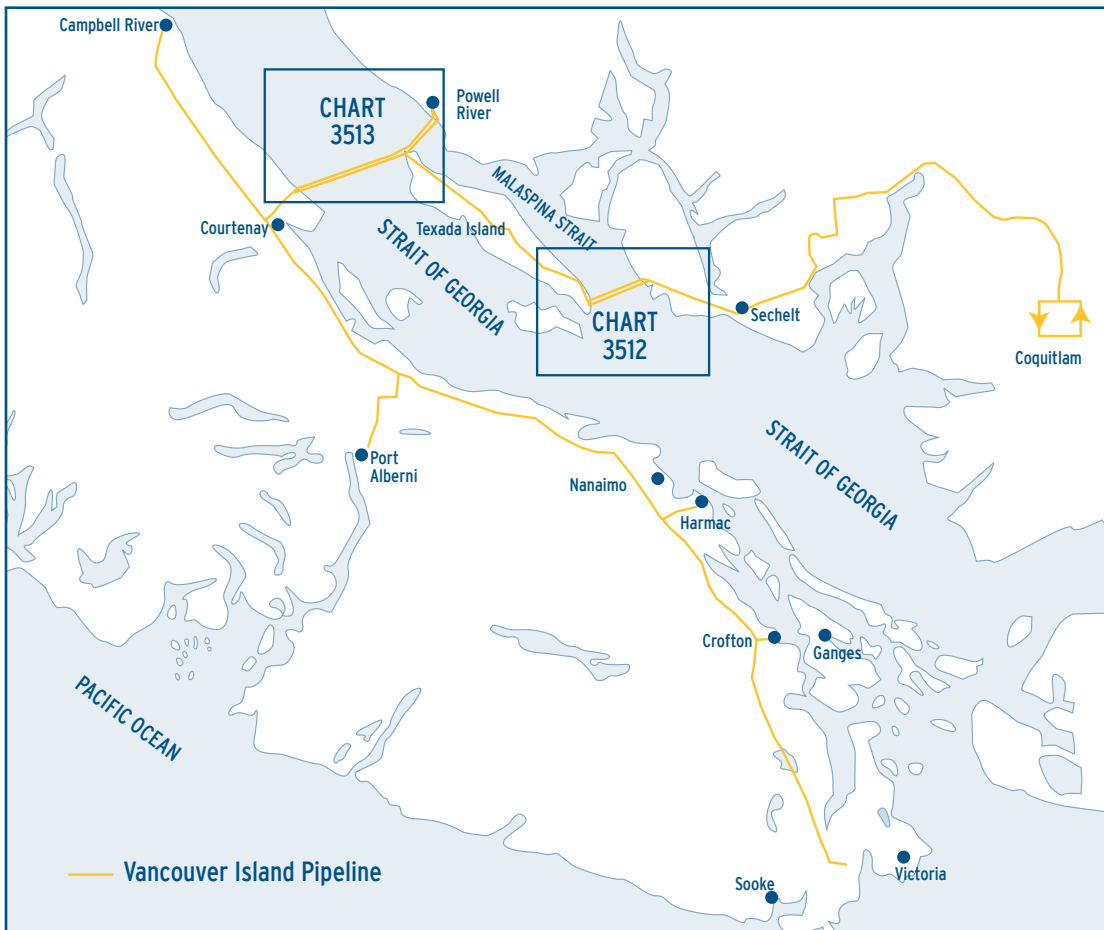


Don't let your lines get caught in our lines



Take note

Please avoid bottom-fishing along the Vancouver Island Pipeline Right of Way.

Prior to any fishing activity on the Georgia or Malaspina Straits, we urge you to confirm the location of the right of way on Marine Charts 3512 and 3513.

Residential, commercial and industrial customers on Vancouver Island, the Sunshine Coast and in Squamish receive their natural gas supply from the high-pressure Vancouver Island Pipeline that was completed in 1991.

The pipeline begins in Coquitlam, runs north to Squamish and then westerly along Howe Sound to the Sunshine Coast. From a beachhead north of Sechelt, twin 10-inch lines cross underwater to Anderson Bay on Texada Island, where a single 10-inch line traverses the length of Texada Island to Kiddie Point. From Kiddie Point, twin 10-inch lines cross to both Powell River and to Vancouver Island near Little River.

The sub-sea lines are laid within the boundary of a Right of Way on the ocean floor. In many areas along this route these lines span submarine trenches and have mechanical supporting devices and cathodic protection anodes attached to them for the safe operation of the pipeline system. Your fishing gear could easily become entangled in these attachments or in the pipelines, resulting in damage or loss of your equipment. These pipelines are located within a legal right of way and under no circumstances will compensation for lost fishing gear or equipment be paid.
